
Bachelor of Arts Psychology



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The psychology major is designed to develop knowledge and skills that prepare students for a variety of careers in the mental health and human services fields. Optional concentrations are available for students wishing to advance in their current careers or change career direction. In addition, the applied focus of this program offers ideal preparation for students interested in pursuing a career in clinical or counseling psychology through graduate-level study.

As a psychology major, you will

- Study important ideas and trends in the field of counseling psychology
- Learn how to apply psychological principles to behavioral problems
- Learn how human diversity and social responsibility issues intersect with psychological research and practice
- Individualize your degree to reflect your interests and enrich your personal development

This program offers a flexible and practical approach to college study. Small online classes are guided by faculty who are practitioners in the field. You will join a community of adult students who bring rich experience to their studies in a program that values the experience that adults bring to college study.

B.A. Psychology Graduates

Graduates of this program will be prepared for careers in a variety of human service settings, including hospitals, mental health centers, addictions programs, health and wellness centers, aging and long-term care facilities, corrections, and youth services settings. In addition, graduates of this program may work in marketing, sales, human resources, childcare, education, or managerial positions.

Continue to an Advanced Degree

Union provides a seamless transition into graduate study for qualified students through its Master of Arts program with a major in Clinical Mental Health Counseling (C.M.H.C.). The C.M.H.C. program prepares students for certification or licensure as professional counselors or clinical mental health counselors. Additional opportunities exist to transition into the Health & Wellness, and Leadership, Public Policy & Social Issues majors as well.

Optional Concentrations

- Forensic Psychology focuses on the interface between psychology and the law as well as the knowledge and skills integral to careers in the criminal justice system, law enforcement, and correctional psychology.
- Addictions Studies focuses on knowledge and skills specific to applied work in the addictions field. Topics explored include theories of addiction, assessment, and therapeutic methods.
- Holistic Psychology focuses on the interrelationships between health, psychology, and spirituality as well as skills needed to be successful in careers such as holistic health, counseling, and spiritual direction.

The B.A. in Psychology requires 48 credits in the major. Students complete 24 required credits in foundational courses and 24 credits in electives, in addition to a capstone portfolio.
