While this major does not result in a teaching license, earning a B.S. degree with a major in Child & Adolescent Development provides graduates with opportunities to move on the California Permit Matrix. Additionally, it prepares graduates to work in a variety of early childhood settings outside the public school system, such as private childcare programs, church sponsored schools and afterschool care, government agencies (Head Start), nonprofit organizations, and social service agencies. Careers could include directly working with children, supervision and training of staff, support and education for families, and advocacy within the community about the education and needs of young children. It is a student's responsibility to consult with your Department of Education board, of your respective state, to identify state and individual specific requirements, should you desire to pursue that avenue.
