We are deeply honored to have as our speaker today the Honorable Danny K. Davis, U.S. Representative from Illinois's seventh congressional district since 1996, and a proud alumnus who earned his Ph.D. from Union in 1977.

Congressman Davis has spent his life championing social justice. He is a servant leader whose life parallels Union's mission to transform lives and communities. He has dedicated his career to the advancement of racial, ethnic, and underrepresented populations in higher education. He is resolutely committed to preserving our democracy, protecting social security, and enhancing our nation's gains in civil and human rights.

He has always fought on the side of justice in creating legislation for job creation, to fight poverty, to improve access and affordability for higher education, and has worked diligently for youth and criminal justice reform. Throughout his career Dr. Davis has advocated for women's rights, voting rights, protection of the environment, consumer and labor protections, and ensuring quality, affordable health care for all.

Congressman Davis is a significant voice in Congress and has served on numerous committees, including the Committee on Ways and Means. He is a member of the Congressional Black Caucus, the Progressive Caucus, the Urban Caucus, Community Health Center's Caucus, the Congressional Caucus on Black Men and Boys, and is Co-Chair of the Congressional Caucus on Re-entry.

Congressman Davis has distinguished himself as an articulate voice for his constituents and as an effective legislator able to move major bills to passage. He has developed a unique and energetic style of communication and interaction with his constituents setting up dozens of advisory task forces to consider significant questions of public policy. He hosts weekly television and radio shows that feature audience call-in. He produces regular written reports to every household in the district, and maintains weekly office hours in the district.

Born in Parkdale, Arkansas, Dr. Davis moved to the west side of Chicago in 1961, after having earned a bachelor's degree from Arkansas A.M. & N. College. He holds a master's degree from Chicago State University in addition to his Ph.D. from Union. Before seeking public office, he had productive careers as an educator, community organizer, health planner/administrator, and civil rights advocate.

Throughout the years, Congressman Davis has been a friend to Union and to higher education for all. He has welcomed us to his office and hosted events in Washington, D.C. We thank him for his life's work, his dedication to higher education, and his service to others, and are deeply honored to host him as the 2020 Commencement Keynote Speaker.

# The Mark Dunakin Memorial Award Recognizing Extraordinary Achievement

Union Institute & University is honored to present the ninth and tenth Mark Dunakin Memorial Awards to two recent graduates of Union Institute & University who have displayed extraordinary service and achievement throughout their undergraduate program.

The award is named for Police Sergeant Mark Dunakin, an 18-year veteran of the Oakland Police Department, assigned to the Traffic Division. He was a member of the Alameda County Sheriff's Office before joining the OPD as a patrol officer in 1991. As a sergeant, he served in criminal investigations and homicide, and taught academy recruits the intricacies of homicide and robbery investigations. He transferred to the coveted traffic motor squad in 1996.

On March 21, 2009, at the age of 40, Mark was one of the four Oakland police officers killed in the line of duty by a parolee. A student and part of the UI&U family, Sergeant Dunakin had just completed requirements for his Bachelor of Science in Criminal Justice Management at the time of his death.

He was awarded his B.S. degree posthumously at the commencement ceremony in July 2009, the event he so looked forward to joining. Sergeant Dunakin is survived by his wife, Angela, his three children, his parents, David and Karen Dunakin, and his brother, Christopher Dunakin.

In honor of his service and sacrifice, Union Institute & University has designated the Mark Dunakin Memorial Award to be presented to a new graduate of Union Institute & University's Criminal Justice Management program who serves in law enforcement and who emulates Sergeant Dunakin's commitment to community service, academic success, and enthusiasm for Union's Criminal Justice Management program. The award honors graduates who possess certain criteria, including I) academic excellence and achievement toward their degree; 2) earning the respect of his/her law enforcement peers; and 3) exemplifying the true meaning of being a law enforcement officer.

#### Detective Sergeant Marya Mason, Los Angeles Police Department

Sergeant Mason is a 23-year veteran of the Los Angeles Police Department, holding the dual status title of detective sergeant, a rare accomplishment within the ranks of the LAPD.

She is Officer-in-Charge of the Operations-South Bureau Homeless Outreach and Proactive Engagement Unit (HOPE) that coordinates with the Unified Homeless Response Center to manage homeless encampments in the South Bureau of Los Angeles.

In her 23-year career, Sergeant Mason has received 108 commendations for service to her department and the communities she serves. She earned the LAPD Police Star and Life Saving Medal in 2018, demonstrating her dedication to service, her tenacity in the face of danger, and her compassion for humanity.

## Detective James Tidwell, Sacramento County Sheriff's Department

Detective Tidwell has served the Sacramento County Sheriff's Office for I4 years. He is known as being a consummate professional on every level, upholding the department's core values with his selfless service to his profession,

his fellow officers, and his community. In addition to his work as detective, he is a member of the Sacramento County Sheriff's Mobile Field Force (MFF) Team.

One nominator wrote: "Detective Tidwell exemplifies the Sacramento County Sheriff's Office motto, "Service with Concern," even under duress, character attack, and physical assault. He always performs in a professional manner. His work ethic, core beliefs, and actions are commendable, while his approach and spirit remain humble.

The Union community congratulates Detective Tidwell for his dedication to those he serves, his support of the values of his department, and his academic achievement.

Rudolph C. Ryser, Ph.D., 1996

Chair of the Board of Directors, Executive Director Center for World Indigenous Studies

Dr. Ryser is a member of the Cowlitz Indian Tribe and founder of the Center for World Indigenous Studies. He is internationally recognized as the principle

architect and spokesperson of theories and principles of Fourth World Geopolitics.

Throughout his career, Dr. Ryser has contributed to policies and laws affecting American Indians and indigenous peoples internationally, including the development of the United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples and the United Nation's World Conference on Indigenous Peoples. He is the author of several seminal books on indigenous nations and the *Fourth World Geopolitical Reader*.

A beloved professor, his students refer to him as a teacher's teacher and he is known for his commitment to mentoring students as future leaders and activist scholars.

Dr. Rudolph has steadfastly advocated for diversity and inclusion. He has demonstrated academic excellence, creative and critical thinking, and connection of the application of theory and process. With integrity and compassion, his pursuit of social justice has been enacted on a global scale.

## 2020 Legacy Alumni Award



Cecil Thomas, B.S., 2012
Ohio State Senator

As a Cincinnati Police officer for 27 years, Senator Thomas worked to improve minority representation. Through his actions, the Cincinnati Police Department increased the percentage of African Americans and women on the force to 40 percent.

After retiring from the police department, he served as the Executive Director of the Cincinnati Human Relations Commission, and in 2005, was elected to the Cincinnati City Council. He initiated the Cincinnati Youth Street Worker Program to reduce violence and his methods to improve community and police relations are now modeled internationally.

In 2014, Senator Thomas was elected to represent Ohio's Ninth Senate district. He serves as Assistant Minority Leader and ranking member of the Senate judiciary committee, as well as the government oversight, health, insurance, and local government committees.

Senator Thomas is a public servant who demonstrates his commitment to learning, service and social responsibility in everything he undertakes.

### The Academic Regalia

The colorful and distinctive garb at commencement ceremonies had its origin in the High Middle Ages, 12th and 13th centuries, when the university itself came into being. The nascent universities grew up in the shadow of the church and most of the knowledge they disseminated was theological or ecclesiastical. The cap, gown, and hood grew out of the clerical dress of that period.

The mortarboard descends from a favorite headdress of the medieval laity, the pileus, a close-fitting felt cap that was adopted by the Church in I3II and became typical at the universities. Two varieties of the pileus survive: Cambridge and Oxford versions. The Cambridge tradition is a beret-like "soft cap" and the Oxford cap is a mortarboard.

The colorful academic hood is another medieval relic descended from cowls worn by monks to ward off cold drafts in English monasteries. The shorter, three-foot bachelor's hood is rarely seen today; master's hoods are three and one-half feet; and doctoral hoods are four feet and have panels at the side.

The Intercollegiate Code (see following) provides that a hood should be lined with the official colors of the institution conferring the degree, and the lining is worn exposed; hence, Union Institute & University hoods are lined with green and gold. The same code provides that the hood should be trimmed with the color indicating the discipline to which the degree pertains.

Both the gown and the hood indicate the degree and discipline earned. A bachelor's gown falls in a straight line and has full bias-cut, pointed sleeves. A master's gown is has long closed sleeves. A doctor's gown has bell-shaped sleeves, velvet panels down the front and around the neck of the gown, and three velvet bars on each sleeve.
