Master of Science in Health Care Leadership

Health care is complex and undergoing transformation toward a care coordination and wellness-focused system. Success within this evolving model requires fresh ways of thinking and insights beyond traditional management expertise. In effect, successful health care leaders need to be change agents within their own complex organizations—all the while monitoring the dynamic and turbulent external environment impacting on their organization.

The UI&U MS-HCL program provides a unique online curriculum supported by a foundation of 55 years of service and transforming the lives of working adults. Created to transform health care, the MS-HCL program fosters creative and ethical leadership through social entrepreneurship, health informatics, application of a population health framework, and individualized mentoring from successful professionals.

This program supports students to lead financially successful health care organizations capable of providing innovative services and programs as the entire health care field transitions from sick care to wellness; and under circumstances in which there are no precedents and definitive models of success—at the same time serving communities and their residents while being creative and innovative.

In addition, the UI&U's MS-HCL program offers the most important determinant of long-term leadership success: mentoring. Mentors will guide and demonstrate through example how to understand one's own skills, limitations, and ambitions while fulfilling the needs of the health care organization. Mentors will model how to maintain positive working relationships with key stakeholders connected to that health care organization such as community members, patients and their families, physicians, nurses and other employees, and board members.

Each student receives membership in the American College of Healthcare Executives (ACHE)—the premier international organization for more than 40,000 health leaders. Upon graduation, students leave with an e-portfolio of resources; and a plan for completing a self-selected and work-related project.
